What is Financial Aid? Money given, paid or lent to help students pay for college

- Gift Aid
 - -Grants and scholarships (free money)
- Self Help Aid
 - -Loans (money borrowed that must be repaid)
 - -Work-study (campus job to earn money)

Who qualifies for financial aid?

- U.S. citizens and permanent residents*
- High school graduates/GED holder
- Those with satisfactory academic performance







AB 130 allows students who meet AB 540 criteria to apply for and receive non-state funded scholarships for public colleges and universities

Basic Need Equation

Budget/Cost of Attendance (COA)

Expected Family Contribution (EFC)

= Financial Need (Eligibility)

You will receive FINANCIAL AID that meets your calculated FINANCIAL NEED, however, it might not be your preferred type of aid



Budget/Cost of Attendance (COA) includes:

- Tuition and fees
- Room and board
- Books and supplies
- Transportation
- Miscellaneous personal expenses









Eligibility Varies Based on COA

Santa Barbara Scholarship Foundation-Scholarships

FAFSA = Free Application for Federal Student Aid www.fafsa.gov

The FAFSA form (along with a GPA Verification Form if you school requests it) is required to apply for federal **AND** state financial aid.

Deadline = March 2 of every year (renewable)



FAFSA allows students to apply for the following types of aid:

- Grants (Federal and State) (Free)
 - ✓ Pell Grant (up to \$5,775)
 - ✓ Federal Supplemental Education Opportunity Grant (FSEOG) (up to \$4,000)
 - Cal Grants A (3.0 GPA) and B (2.0 GPA) (up to \$12,240-UC, \$5,472-CSU, \$9,084-private)
 - ✓ Cal Grant C (community college, up to \$3,009)
- Federal Work Study (Free)
 - ✓ Student employment not to exceed 19.5 hours per week (amount varies)
- Federal Loans (Direct, Subsidized or Unsubsidized)
 - ✓ Federal Perkins Loan (up to \$22,000 max for 4 years)
 - Direct Stafford Loans (up to \$22-50,000 max for 4 years)
 - ✓ Parent Plus Loans (varies upon need)

PRIVATE SCHOLARSHIPS ARE NOT INCLUDED IN FAFSA, HOWEVER SOME INSTITUTIONAL SCHOLARSHIPS ARE GRANTED USING FAFSA INFORMATION!

- Be sure to submit the FAFSA or Cal Dream Act and GPA Verification form by March 2
- Attending a CSU or UC campus
- For families with incomes of up to \$150,000
- U.S. citizens, permanent residents or AB 540
- California residents
- Maintain a 2.0 GPA
- "Meet certain income and other financial aid standards"
- Up to 20% of mandatory system-wide fees for students whose annual family income is up to \$100,000
- No less than 10% of mandatory system-wide fees for students whose annual family income is between \$100,001 and \$150,000

What is AB 540?

- AB 540 authorizes any student, including undocumented students who meet specified criteria, to pay in-state tuition at California public colleges and universities.
- AB 540 does not change a student's resident or immigrant status.
- AB 540 does not provide access to federal financial aid for undocumented students, however, state financial aid* is available.

AB 540 Eligibility

Students are eligible if

- They have attended a California High School for 3 or more years;
- They have or will graduate from a California High School or receive the equivalent, such as a G.E.D.;
- Submit an affidavit to the California public college or university where they are attending or plan to attend. In this statement students declare that they meet all AB 540 requirements and that they have filed an application to adjust their immigration status or will do so as soon as they are eligible to do so.
